Analysis
 In the lecture (3:14) Prof. Nick Groom discusses an extract from Dr. Seward's diary in which Seward and Van Helsing examine Lucy's wound. Read the extract from Chapter 10 below and highlight all of the medical language that Stoker uses. What is the effect of all of this medical language, and of this scene in general? Write your answer as a PEE/PEA paragraph.

Evaluation

5. Throughout the video Prof. Nick Groom discusses Dracula's bestiality as well as his more human elements. Using the ideas from the lecture as well as your own knowledge, write a speech in which you argue for **or** against the following statement:

"Dracula is more animal than human."

Success Criteria:

Glossary

- **Contagion** The spread of disease from one person to another through close contact. *e.g. The rooms were well-ventilated and so had little risk of contagion.*
- Pestilence A fatal, epidemic disease; historically it was often used to describe the bubonic plague.
 e.g. No prayers could stop the spread of the pestilence.
- Spectral An adjective used to describe something that is like a ghost (it comes from the noun spectre).
 e.g. The man had a spectral, menacing face.
- **Phantasm** An illusion, apparition, or ghost; similar to a phantom. *e.g. The silhouette came out of the dark like a terrible phantasm.*
- **Corporeal** An adjective that describes something that relates to a person's physical body. *e.g. Hunger is just one example of our many corporeal needs.*
- **Ecology** A branch of biology that is concerned with the study of organisms; or the relationship between organisms and how they interact with the environment round them. *e.g. The oil spill caused terrible damage to the fragile ecology of the coast.*
- **Sentient** Able to perceive or feel things. *e.g. Humans are sentient beings.*
- **Vivisection** The practice of performing operations on live animals for scientific research. *e.g. Vivisection is a very controversial form of animal testing.*
