Glossary

- **Accomplice** A person who helps another commit a crime. *e.g. She was being prosecuted as an accomplice in the murder.*
- **Homicidal** Synonym for murderous. *e.g. The paranoid schizophrenic had homicidal thoughts.*
- **Disaffected** Dissatisfied, especially with people and systems of authority. *e.g. The teenager felt disaffected with his school.*
- **Phobia** An extreme and irrational fear or aversion to something. *e.g. Many people have a phobia about spiders.*
- Everyman character A character in fiction who is meant to represent an everyday, ordinary person. e.g. With the common surname Smith, it is clear that Winston is meant to be an Everyman character.
