Put these events from Stave One in the correct order, to see how much you remember.

- c) Marley says Scrooge will end up the same as him if he doesn't change and that Scrooge will be visited by three spirits who are the only chance Scrooge has of saving himself.
- d) Fred, Scrooge's nephew arrives to wish him Merry Christmas and to invite him to spend Christmas with him but Scrooge refuses rudely.
- e) Scrooge arrives home and sees the face of Jacob Marley in the door knocker.
- f) Scrooge is in his counting house it's Christmas eve and he and his clerk bob Cratchit are still working.
- g) The ghost of Jacob Marley appears he is wrapped in heavy chains and is doomed to wandering the earth.
