'Tiny Tim's becomes the symbolic death; the one that brings Scrooge back to life.' Symbols are significant throughout <i>A Christmas Carol</i>. - 5. Imagine that a new edition of *A Christmas Carol* is going to be published. Your job is to design the book's front cover art and the descriptive "blurb" on the back.
 - a) Fold a sheet of paper so that you can provide both a front and a back cover.
 - b) For the front cover, you can use images collaged from elsewhere, draw the artwork, or make the art on a computer. You might depict a key scene from the book that can stand for the entire story; you might simply use a few well-chosen images that evoke the book's mood. Be sure to include the title and the author's name.
 - c) On the back cover, write a brief summary of the book's plot and a short reviewing explaining why someone might want to buy and read this book. Include a paragraph-long biography of the author at the bottom, using facts researched on the internet or in other books.

<u>Extension</u>: Be prepared to explain in class/ to your teacher why you think your cover design might attract more readers than the current design. You might prepare this as a two minute "sales pitch" for your cover.

Glossary

- **Symbolic** serving as a symbol for an abstract idea or broader theme.
- **Catharsis** the process of releasing, and thereby providing relief from, strong or repressed emotions.
- **Comforter** a woolen scarf, often given as blankets to babies.
- **Sponge away** To clean (some surface) vigorously or continuously with a sponge.
